LENT IS THE TIME TO CELEBRATE

Pope Francis is asking us through this beautiful time of Lent to be people of prayer, to fast and to give to the poor. Recently, I visited the oldest Catholic Church in Australia, St. John's in Richmond, Tasmania. It was a beautiful little church and I thought of the many generations of people before me who had come to this little church to pray and of their generosity in giving their money to build this place of prayer.

As I sat there praying, I felt a real sense of the sacredness.

Pope Francis is calling us to be people of prayer. He is asking us to fast not just from food, to fast from anger, from jealousy, from hatred, from all within us that causes disturbance. We can only do that if we are people of prayer. But he also asks us to think of the poor. To think of those in various parts of the world where people have no food at all. Many children are dying. So, that little bit of money that you have for your allowance, one or two dollars, to put in the 'Project Compassion' box is not for us, but for those who have nothing. It's not a time to have a sad looking face. It's a time of joy, of hope, and of love. To reach that, sometimes, we have to sacrifice.

There are six of us in my family.. I have two brothers, one is younger, two sisters. My father and my older sister died a long time ago. My mother is still alive.


The first impression of Australia: I felt quiet. I like here because of the parks everywhere and being free from pollution.




MARCO
